Google Announces In-Kind Monthly Advertising for Nonprofit Organizations.

Google supports the important work of nonprofit organizations around the world and as such, is offering in-kind advertising every month from Google Ad Grants. Google has supported countless organizations that have benefitted from Google Ads by way of increased volunteer engagement and donations as more individuals become aware of the nonprofit through targeted advertising using the industry's leading technology.

Grant Amount: Grants of \$10,000 in the form of online advertising each month are available.

Eligibility: To be eligible, applicants must be a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization who acknowledge and agree to Google's required certifications regarding nondiscrimination and donation receipt and use, and have a high-quality website that meets the Ad Grants website policy.

Due Date: Applications are accepted year-round.

The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences Supports Programs that Empower Future Film-Makers.

The Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences is seeking proposals from high-quality educational programs that identify and empower future filmmakers from non-traditional backgrounds. Targeted programs include those that encourage an appreciation of film as both a vocation and an art form and those that provide direct, hands-on opportunities for participants to gain the filmmaking skills they need to tell their stories. Programs that will be considered include but are not limited to:

- **Craft workshops**, in which participants are trained in practical areas of filmmaking. Particular emphasis is placed on animation, casting, cinematography, costume design, editing, hairstyling, makeup, music, production design, set decoration, sound, visual effects, marketing, and distribution.
- **Artist-in-residence, visiting artist and seminar/conference programs**, in which visiting film professionals work closely with participants in master classes or one-on-one sessions. Programs in which visiting artists participate only in post-screening Q&As or general audience presentations are not eligible.
- **Training and bridge programs**, in which participants are trained and then placed in film industry jobs. Mentoring programs are eligible. Professional development programs that serve underrepresented populations will be considered.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts typically range from \$5,000 to \$20,000.

Eligibility: Applying organizations must:

- Have nonprofit, tax-exempt status at the time of application;
- Apply directly on its own behalf (fiscal sponsors for U.S.-based organizations are not allowed);
- Have a three-year history of film-specific programs; and
- Submit complete, punctual final reports for all Academy grants received, and maintain an excellent submission record.

Ethics and Excellence in Journalism Foundation Invests in Building Journalism Professionalism.

The Ethics and Excellence in Journalism Foundation's (EEJF) mission is to invest in the future of journalism by building the ethics, skills, and opportunities needed to advance principled, probing news and information now and for the future.

Through its support of non-profit investigative organizations and educational institutions, the Foundation seeks to:

- Increase the quantity, quality and ethical standards of investigative reporting and watchdog journalism on state and local issues;
- Stimulate and nurture the development of organizations, infrastructures, services, collaborations and business models that can help secure a future for investigative reporting and watchdog journalism; and
- Encourage the development of digital innovations that make data about state and local issues more available to the public.

Through its support of professional development programs at non-profits and educational institutions, the Foundation seeks to:

- Improve the credibility and impact of journalism;
- Stimulate adherence to the highest ethical standards and practices by both traditional and new media;
- Sustain and encourage more journalism that produces civic results;
- Help journalists make use of new tools and new outlets for their work; and
- Increase and renew the enthusiasm of journalists for their important work.

The Foundation will also consider applications for journalism initiatives with special promise or distinction, particularly collaborative efforts.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts not specified.

Eligibility: Journalism schools and other non-profit organizations focused on the news media are eligible to apply.

Actor's Equity Foundation Offers Support to Nonprofit Theatres in the United States.

The Actor's Equity Foundation exists to support professional theatre at all levels in the United States. For the remainder of 2019, the Foundation is offering support to nonprofit theatres who have an established artistic and administrative track records, history of fiscal responsibility, and have worked to improve theatre works.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts not specified.

Eligibility: The Foundation's Theatre Grants are awarded to theatres that have a current 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status, an established artistic and administrative track record, a history of fiscal responsibility, and have worked to improve the state of the theatre.

Shakespeare in American Communities Supports Productions of Shakespeare's Plays and Related Educational Activities for Middle and High School Students in Schools and Juvenile Justice Settings.

Shakespeare in American Communities is a national theater program of the National Endowment for the Arts in partnership with Arts Midwest bringing performances and related educational activities to audiences across the country. The program supports high-quality, professional productions of Shakespeare's plays and related educational activities for middle and high school students in underserved schools and juvenile justice settings throughout the United States.

For School grants, applicants must:

- Conduct programming between August 1, 2020, and July 31, 2021.
- Perform a Shakespeare play with a professional team of actors. The purpose of this program is to give students exposure to a live theatrical performance. Productions inspired, written, or loosely based on Shakespeare's text or play do not meet the intent of the program and do not qualify.
- Conduct related educational activities for students. Activities must be led by experienced teaching artists or actors with strong credentials and training. Activities must take place in conjunction with the Shakespeare production. Examples of these activities include workshops,

in-depth pre- or post-performance discussions/talkbacks, seminars, and curriculum-based residencies.

- Reach ten or more middle or high schools with performance and educational activities. The majority of schools must educate underserved students whose access to the performing arts is limited by ethnic background, economic conditions, disability, geographic location, or other barriers. This may include schools in rural or urban communities or federally-recognized tribal communities.

For Juvenile Justice grants, applicants must:

- Conduct programming between August 1, 2020, and July 31, 2021.
- Conduct educational programming exploring Shakespeare's text through frequent contact over a significant number of visits. Examples of these activities may include workshops, discussions, seminars, and residencies.
- Partner with the juvenile justice system to reach youths. This may include juvenile facilities or detention centers, educational schools/programs specifically for juvenile offenders or incarcerated youths, court-appointed programs, short- or long-term treatment centers, or transitions centers. The facilities must reach juvenile offenders are defined as youths (18 years or younger) who have been found guilty in the juvenile justice system of committing a delinquent act.
- Engage a minimum of two teaching artists, staff, or personnel in theater education programming for this target population. Activities must be led by experienced teaching artists, staff, or personnel with strong credentials and experience working within the justice system.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts range from \$20,000 to \$25,000.

Eligibility: Applicants must be a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization, a unit of state or local government. Additionally, applicants must be a U.S.-based theater company that compensates all professional performers and related or supporting professional personnel at no less than the prevailing minimum compensation.

- For School grants, applicants must have produced Shakespeare or classically-based repertoire within the past five years and have a minimum of two years' experience providing performances and related educational activities to middle and/or high schools.
- For the Juvenile Justice Grants, applicants must have a minimum of two years' experience partnering with the justice system to provide theater education programs.

Due Date: An Intent to Apply must be submitted by December 6, 2019. Applications are due on February 12, 2020.

NEW!!**The Terra Foundation Supports Exhibitions of Historical American Art.**

The Terra Foundation supports exhibitions that increase the understanding and appreciation of historical American art (circa 1500–1980). The foundation has a particular interest in exhibitions that add an international dimension to the study or presentation of historical American art. The Terra Foundation requires that exhibitions include the following:

- New ways of thinking about American art,
- Scholarly interpretation and a contextualized presentation,
- Engagement with exceptional art objects,
- Related scholarly publications, and
- Related educational programming tailored to the intended audience.

Grant funding is also available for exhibitions that include objects from the Terra Foundation collection. A project may include:

- A venue outside the United States
- A focused thesis that makes a significant contribution to scholarship on historical American art in an international context
- International curatorial involvement
- Inclusion of international catalog essayists
- A presentation that is meaningful to international audiences

Visual arts that are eligible for Terra Foundation Exhibition Grants include painting; sculpture; works on paper (prints, drawings, watercolors, photographs); decorative arts (typically handmade functional objects of high aesthetic quality); design (objects of high aesthetic quality; excludes industrial design); video art; and conceptual art. Excluded are architecture, performance art, and commercial film/animation. Exhibition Grant proposals will be reviewed by an external panel of scholars and curators who are specialists in historical American art.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts not specified.

Eligibility: The Foundation only accepts proposals from institutions with United States 501(c)(3) status or the international equivalent. Exhibition Grants are not made to individuals.

Due Date: Letters of Interest are due March 2, 2020.

The Classics for Kids Foundation empowers young people to shape their futures through music, helps build sustainable stringed instruments music programs, and provides grants for the purchase of high-quality instruments.

Grant Amount: Matching grants of up to \$5,000 are available.

Eligibility: To be eligible, the applicant must be public or private schools or a nonprofit organization operated by 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organizations as recognized by the Internal Revenue Service.

The Puffin Foundation West Accepting Applications for Social Justice Art Projects.

The Puffin Foundation West is now accepting applications for social justice art projects by individuals or organizations that educate and inform the public on important, timely topics facing the country and planet that others might hesitate to fund. The Foundation will consider projects from individual artists and organizations working within the visual arts, dance, music, theater, photography, film/video, writing, poetry, and public interest platforms.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts range from \$550 to \$2,500. Foundation grants are relatively modest in size and, therefore, the larger the annual budget, the less likely the foundation may deem the funds necessary.

Eligibility: Tax-exempt organizations and individuals are eligible to apply. The Foundation typically will not consider grants from nonprofits whose annual budget is \$1 million or more. The overall size and annual budget of each applicant are taken into consideration.

The Shubert Foundation Supports Theatre Programs.

The Shubert Foundation supports theatre programs. Applications are evaluated individually and with appropriate allowance for size and resources. The standard for awarding these grants is based on an assessment of each organization's operation and its contribution to the field. Artistic achievement, administrative strength, and fiscal stability are factored into each evaluation, as is the company's development of new work and other significant contributions to the field of professional theatre in the US.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts not specified.

Eligibility: Applicants must be located in the US and have current 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status in order to be eligible for funding. The Foundation provides grants only to organizations that have an established artistic and administrative track record, as well as a history of fiscal responsibility. The Foundation does not make grants to individuals, nor does it provide funds for project support,

audience development, direct subsidy of reduced-price admissions, conduit organizations (agencies that disburse funds to individuals or other organizations), media (film, TV, and radio), renovation projects, loans, capital or endowment campaigns.

Due Date: Applications are due on December 4, 2019.

The MAP Fund Seeks Applications from Performance Artists Who Disrupt, Complicate, and Challenge the Social and Cultural Hierarchy.

The MAP Fund seeks applications for live performance projects throughout the United States that embody a spirit of deep inquiry. MAP has a particular interest in supporting artists who question, disrupt, complicate, and challenge inherited notions of social and cultural hierarchy across the current American landscape, including issues of class, sexual orientation, gender, generation, religious affiliation, and other aspects of cultural difference.

Grant Amount: Up to 40 grants ranging from \$10,000 to \$45,000 will be awarded.

Eligibility: Projects must be completed between July 2019 and June 2021, and a tax-exempt, U.S.-based nonprofit organization must be responsible for receiving and distributing the grant funds.

Due Date: The application process opens on December 3, 2018, and closes on February 15, 2019. During the month of November, MAP offers support to applicants who would like staff to read and respond to a project description draft prior to submitting an application.

The Fender Music Foundation Announces Guitar Donations to Nonprofit Music Instruction Programs.

The Fender Music Foundation awards instruments and equipment to eligible nonprofit music instruction programs. The donated items are lightly used, blemished, or otherwise imperfect and have been collected by the foundation from manufacturers and retailers. The foundation currently is awarding acoustic guitars, electric guitars, acoustic-electric guitars, bass guitars, and the equipment necessary to play them. In addition, other traditional music instruments, including string instruments, woodwind instruments, brass instruments, percussion instruments, and keyboards, are sometimes available. DJ equipment and computers are not available through the program.

Grant Amount: Awards include musical instruments & equipment.

Eligibility: The foundation awards instruments only to music instruction programs at public schools or operated by 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organizations as recognized by the Internal Revenue Service. To qualify as a music instruction program, participants in the program must be learning how to make music and the program must fit into one of the following categories: in-school music classes, in which

the students make music; afterschool music programs that are not run by the school; community music programs that offer music instruction to community members; and music therapy programs in which the participants make the music.

The California Arts Council and the National Arts and Disability Center Accepting Applications for Accessible Arts Programs.

The California Arts Council and the National Arts and Disability Center have partnered to provide small grants to arts organizations seeking to make their programs accessible for all. California-based arts organizations may request small grants to support the hiring or involvement of artists with disabilities in arts events, and/or to increase the attendance and enhance the experience for audiences with disabilities.

Sample projects included:

- Services and supports to hire California artists with disabilities
- Increased access for audience members with disabilities to enjoy the full experience by creating alternative formats for materials such as large print or Braille, audio description, ASL interpreter, and/or captioning
- Attendance at meetings, workshops, and trainings that address accessibility
- Hiring a consultant to advise or provide training to improve the accessibility of the organization or its programs

Grant Amount: Grant amounts of up to \$2,500 are available.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants must be:

- A California-based nonprofit arts organization with a history of arts programming for a minimum of three years prior to the time of application
- Local arts agency or unit of government with a history of arts programming for a minimum of three years prior to the time of application
- The applicant must demonstrate proof of nonprofit status under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, or section 23701d of the California Revenue and Taxation Code, or must be a unit of government
- An applicant without nonprofit status may use a California-based fiscal sponsor that has nonprofit status, 501(c)(3)

Due Date: Applications are accepted on an ongoing basis until funds are used. Applications must be received at least 30 days prior to a proposed event.

Eligibility: To be eligible, an organization must be tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3), (4), (6) or (19) of the Internal Revenue Code; a recognized government entity (i.e., state, county, or city agency, including law enforcement or fire departments, requesting funds exclusively for public purposes); a K-12 public or private school, charter school, community/junior college, state/private college or university; or a church or other faith-based organization with a proposed project that benefits the community at large. Applicants need to be within the service area of individual Walmart stores.

The Hearst Foundations Support Social Service Organizations Including Affordable Housing and Food Delivery.

The Hearst Foundations support well-established, large nonprofit organizations that address significant issues within social service (among others) and that primarily serve large demographic and/or geographic constituencies. The Hearst Foundations fund direct-service organizations that tackle the roots of chronic poverty by applying effective solutions to the most challenging social and economic problems. The Foundations prioritize supporting programs that have proven successful in facilitating economic independence and in strengthening families. Preference is also given to programs with the potential to scale productive practices in order to reach more people in need.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts of up to \$10,000 are available.

Eligibility: Organizations must have 501(c)(3) Status, demonstrate long-term impact, and an operating budget over \$1 million. In limited cases, the foundations fund food banks, food delivery, faith-based organizations, and others.

Due Date: Requests are accepted on an ongoing basis.

The Caplan Foundation for Early Childhood Invites Letters of Intent.

The Caplan Foundation for Early Childhood supports creative, innovative projects and programs designed to significantly enhance the development, health, safety, education, and/or quality of life for children from infancy through five years of age. The Foundation provides funding in the areas of early childhood welfare, early childhood education and play, and parenting education.

1) **Early Childhood Welfare:** Children can only reach their full potential when all aspects of their development, including intellectual, emotional and physical, are optimally supported. Providing a safe and nurturing environment for infants and preschoolers is essential, as is imparting to them the skills of social living in a culturally diverse world. To that end, the Foundation supports programs that research best child-rearing practices and identify models that provide creative, caring environments to ensure all children thrive.

2) **Early Childhood Education and Play:** Research shows that children need to be stimulated as well as nurtured early in life if they are to succeed in school, work, and life. That preparation relates to every aspect of a child's development, from birth to age five, and everywhere a child learns — at home, in childcare settings, and in preschool. To that end, the Foundation seeks to improve the quality of early childhood teaching and learning through the development of innovative curricula and research-based pedagogical standards, as well as the design of imaginative play materials and learning environments.

3) **Parenting Education:** To help parents create nurturing environments for their children, the foundation supports programs that teach parents about developmental psychology, cultural child-rearing differences, pedagogy, issues of health, and prenatal care and diet, as well as programs that provide both cognitive and emotional support to parents.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts not specified.

Eligibility: Organizations must be considered tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

The Bruce J. Heim Foundation seeks to support organizations in a position to help people, especially young people who demonstrate the potential for excellence in an area of interest. The Foundation strives to establish communication with the people it helps to provide congratulations and encouragement, although this is not mandated. Funding is dedicated to nonprofits and projects including university programs, independent secondary schools, and other institutions.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts not specified.

Eligibility: To be eligible, applicants must be a nonprofit organization recognized as tax-exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Kars4Kids Supports Youth Development, Mentoring, and Education.

Kars4Kids supports organizations with a central focus on doing original work on behalf of America's children. Through tuition aid, mentoring, and summer camps, Kars4Kids provides children with the tools and skills to succeed. Programs supported by the foundation are varied and diverse, from programs for foster children to reading programs to those fighting substance abuse through education.

Grant Amount: Grant amounts range from \$500 to \$2,000.

Eligibility: Applicants must be a nonprofit organization with 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status.

Due Date: Applications are accepted on an ongoing basis.

Katie's Krops Accepting Applications for Youth Garden Grants.

Katie's Krops is accepting applications from youth between the ages of 9 and 16 for grants to start a vegetable garden in their community with the purpose of donating the whole harvest to people in need. Katie's Krops grant recipients are required to start and maintain a vegetable garden for a minimum of one planting season. All types of vegetable gardens (e.g., a container garden if the applicant lives in a city or a vegetable garden located in a neighborhood or at a school) will be considered. (Grantees decide where the garden will be grown.) Grant recipients also determine where they will donate their harvest, which is based on needs in their community. For example, the harvest can be used to support classmates in need, homeless shelters, food banks, or neighbors in need.

In addition, grant recipients must donate the entire harvest from the garden to people in need in their community. This may be done through direct donations to families in need or by donating the harvest to soup kitchens or organizations that feed the needy. Grantees are required to submit photos and a brief report on their progress, which includes the amount of produce they have grown, volunteers who have helped, donations made, and what they have learned from their experience.

Grant Amount: Selected applicants will be awarded a gift card to a garden center in their area (up to \$500), support from Katie's Krops, and a digital camera to document the garden and the harvest. In addition to grant materials, winners will be eligible to attend the all-expenses-paid Katie's Krops Summer Camp in Pelion, South Carolina. All grantees that fulfill the grant requirements also are eligible for funds to maintain the garden, year after year, thereby creating a sustainable solution to hunger in their community.

Eligibility: Students between the ages of 9 and 16 years of age and live in the United States. Donated food must go to nonprofit organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Due Date: December 31, 2019

- **Existing Program Evaluation:** These projects evaluate the effectiveness of programs designed to promote positive cognitive and/or achievement outcomes for children (birth through 18 years) from underserved groups and/or low-resourced communities (minority ethnic groups, low-income families). For this type of project, the Foundation favors projects that:
 - Represent strong collaborative relationships between researchers and practitioners, and other community stakeholders as appropriate, and where the community/population being studied is represented in the project's leadership team;
 - Evaluate programs consistent with strength-based approaches rather than deficit models;
 - Projects for which operational funding for the program is already secured so that funding from the Foundation is used only for evaluation activities;
 - Evaluate programs that show promise of being affordable, accessible and sustainable;
 - Projects that employ randomized control designs (including wait-list control designs when an assignment to wait-list condition is randomized). Comparison group designs may also be employed when strong efforts are made to control for potential confounding variables (e.g., due to selection effects). The Foundation rarely funds evaluation projects that employ neither randomized control nor comparison group designs;
 - Projects that evaluate effects on measurable child outcomes;

RedRover Announces Funding for Temporary Pet Boarding Under Circumstances of Domestic Violence.

RedRover seeks to help families with pets safely escape domestic violence together, but understands many domestic violence shelters do not have the capacity to take in pets. Through the Safe Escape grant program, RedRover will help cover the cost of temporary pet boarding while a client is in a domestic violence shelter, though other costs associated with boarding (like vaccinations) can be considered.

In order to be considered the client and Domestic Violence Advocate must meet the following criteria:

Client Responsibilities

- Live in the United States and be actively working with a domestic violence shelter. Clients should be either currently staying at, or have plans to stay at, a domestic violence shelter.
- Provide regular updates to domestic violence agency representative regarding pets

Domestic Violence Advocate Responsibilities

- Establish a plan for how the animal’s needs can be met. For example, contact a boarding kennel and/or veterinary clinic and obtain a written estimate for services needed – i.e. vaccinations, boarding, veterinary care.

Department of Housing and Urban Development Announces Funds Available for Supportive Housing Projects for Persons with Disabilities.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) announces funds available for supportive housing projects for persons with disabilities under the Section 811 Supportive Housing for Persons with Disabilities program. The Section 811 Supportive Housing for Persons with Disabilities Program aims to expand the supply of integrated affordable housing by providing Capital Advance funding for the development of permanent supportive rental housing for very-low-income persons with disabilities age 18 years or older. The program also provides project rental subsidies in the form of a Project Rental Assistance Contract to maintain ongoing affordability over the next forty years. These units provide persons with disabilities the opportunity to live with dignity and independence within the community in an integrated environment that provides access to appropriate and voluntary supportive services.

Sponsors/owners are encouraged to establish formal partnerships with health and human service agencies or other organizations with a demonstrated capacity to coordinate voluntary services and supports to enable individuals to live independently in the community. These partner organizations should assist the owners by providing referrals of potential tenants, assisting with a timely transition

to a unit, and providing the opportunity to access supportive services and supports. Demonstrated capacity may refer to previous experience as well as a well-developed plan to provide referrals, services, and supports.

At a minimum, a well-developed supportive services plan:

- Aligns with the applicant's Local/State's approach to expanding community living opportunities for persons with disabilities.
- Documents an implementation and sustainment strategy for providing outreach and referrals, transition services, tenancy support, and other services and supports as needed.
- Discusses the applicant's approach for development and capacity building within the partnership.

In addition to receiving referrals from partner organizations, the Owners must allow non-elderly persons with disabilities to apply for housing directly without going through a partner agency. There is no limit to the number of agencies an Owner may partner with for referrals and supportive services. In addition to local service providers, HUD encourages applicants to partner with one or more of the following State service agencies that offer supports:

- State Medicaid Agency
- State Developmental Disability Services Agency
- State Mental Health Authority
- Centers for Independent Living

The California Health Facilities Financing Authority Accepting Applications for Small and Rural Health Facilities Adversely Affected by Reductions in Federal Funding.

The California Health Facilities Financing Authority is accepting applications for the Clinic Lifeline Grant Program. The program assists small and rural health facilities, including community-based clinics, that may be adversely affected financially by a reduction or elimination of federal government assistance and that have little to no access to working capital. The support may be used to support core operations as the facility develops plans to deal with a loss of federal government assistance. Each applicant must explain the “Federal Trigger”, which is any federal executive, administrative or legislative action or inaction that impacts any reimbursement or eligibility for participation in any federal program or initiative. A health facility cannot apply until a Federal Trigger has occurred.

Grant Amount: Grants of up to \$250,000 per facility are available.

Eligibility: Eligible applicants must meet one of the following requirements:

- Tax-exempt nonprofit corporation with gross revenues not exceeding ten million dollars
- Tax-exempt nonprofit corporation located in a rural medical service study area
- A clinic operated by a district hospital or health care district

- Provide a minimum of two of the five medical health services listed in the definition below: Medical health services means the services provided by a health facility to persons for prevention, diagnosis, or treatment of illness or injury limited to:
 - reproductive services;
 - family planning;

- sexual health services such as testing and treatment for STD, AIDS, and HIV, etc.;
- geriatric services; or chronic disease prevention, diagnosis, and treatment.
- 50% or more of the persons served have income levels equal to or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level.
- Populations served include vulnerable populations.

The Maternal and Child Health Bureau Offers Support for Early Hearing Detection and Intervention Programs.

The Maternal and Child Health Bureau announces funds available for programs under the Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) Program. The purpose of this program is to support comprehensive and coordinated state and territory EHDI systems of care so families with newborns, infants, and young children up to 3 years of age who are deaf or hard-of-hearing (DHH) receive appropriate and timely services that include hearing screening, diagnosis, and early intervention (EI).
